GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Must be held in a location which is reasonably accessible to the public.
- 2. Must be open to all members of the public unless the law specifically provides otherwise.
- NOTICE REQUIREMENTS:
- 1. In addition to any requirements set forth below, notice must also be in compliance with any other specific statue.
- 2. Chief presiding officer or his/her designee must give notice to the official newspaper and to any members of the news media likely to give notice to the public.
- MANNER OF NOTICE:

Date, time, place, and subject matter, including subject matter to be considered in a closed session, must be provided in a manner and form reasonably likely to give notice to the public.

- TIME FOR NOTICE:
- 1. Normally, a minimum of 24 hours prior to the commencement of the meeting.

2. No less than 2 hours prior to the meeting if the presiding officer establishes there is a good cause that such notice is impossible or impractical. EXEMPTIONS FOR COMMITTEES AND SUB-UNITS:

Legally constituted sub-units of a parent governmental body may conduct a meeting during the recess or immediately after the lawful meeting to act or deliberate upon a subject which was the subject of the meeting, provided the presiding officer publicly announces the time, place, and subject matter of the sub-unit meeting in advance of the meeting of the parent governmental body.

PROCEDURE FOR GOING INTO CLOSED SESSION:

1. Motion must be made, seconded, and carried by roll call majority vote and recorded in the minutes.

2. If motion is carried, chief presiding officer must advise those attending the meeting of the nature of the business to be conducted in the closed session, and the specific statutory exemption under which the closed session is authorized.

STATUTORY EXEMPTIONS UNDER WHICH CLOSED SEESIONS ARE PERMITTED:

- 1. Deliberation of judicial or quasi-judicial matters. Sec. 19.85(1)(a)
- 2. Considering dismissal, demotion, or discipline of any public employee or the investigation of charges against such person and the taking of formal action on any such matter; provided that the person is given actual notice of any evidentiary hearing which may be held prior to final action being taken and of any meeting at which final action is taken. The person under consideration must be advised of his/her right that the evidentiary hearing be held in open session and the notice of the meeting must state the same. Sec. 19.85(1)(b).
- 3. Considering employment, promotion, compensation, or performance evaluation data of any public employee. Sec. 19.85(1)(c).
- 4. Considering strategy for crime detection or prevention. Sec. 19.85(1)(d).
- 5. Deliberating or negotiating the purchase of public properties, the investing of public funds, or conducting other specified public business whenever competitive or bargaining reasons require a closed session. Sec. 19.85(1)(e).
- 6. Considering financial, medical, social, or personal histories or disciplinary data of specific persons, preliminary consideration of specific personnel problems or the investigation of specific charges, which, if discussed in public would likely have an adverse effect on the reputation of the person referred to in such data. Sec. 19.85(1)(f).
- 7. Conferring with legal counsel concerning strategy to be adopted by the governmental body with respect to litigation in which it is or is likely to become involved. Sec. 19.85(1)(g).

8. Considering a request for advice from any applicable ethics board. Sec. 19.85(1)(h).

CLOSED SESSION RESTRICTIONS:

- 1. Must convene in open session before going into closed session.
- 2. May not convene in open session, then convene in closed session and thereafter reconvene in open session with twelve (12) hours <u>unless</u> proper notice of this sequence was given at the same time and in the same manner as the original open meeting.
- 3. Final approval or ratification of a collective bargaining agreement may not be given in closed session.

BALLOTS, VOTES, AND RECORDS:

- 1. Secret ballot is not permitted except for the election of officers of the body or unless otherwise permitted by specific statutes.
- 2. Except as permitted above, any member may require that the vote of each member be ascertained and recorded.
- 3. Motions and roll call votes must be preserved in the record and be available for public inspection.
- USE OF RECORDING EQUIPMENT:

The meeting may be recorded, filmed, or photographed, provided that it does not interfere with the conduct of the meeting or the rights of the participants.

LEGAL INTERPRETATION:

1. The Wisconsin Attorney General will give advice concerning the applicability or clarification of the Open Meeting Law upon request.

2. The municipal attorney will give advice concerning the applicability or clarification of the Open Meeting Law upon request.

PENALTY:

Upon conviction, nay member of a governmental body who knowingly attends a meeting held in violation of Subchapter IV, Chapter 19, Wisconsin Statutes, or who otherwise violates the said law shall be subject to forfeiture of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$300.00 for each violation.

WHEREAS, Lincoln County has 100,843 acres of land enrolled under the County Forest Law and the Forestry, Land and Parks Department has prepared this Plan with the assistance of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources; and

WHEREAS, the Plan lays out the policies, procedures, strategies, and goals that will help guide management decisions on the Forest during the 15-year period from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2035; and WHEREAS, the Plan is a dynamic document, therefore future changes in policy and procedure in the best interest of the county and the public, may be incorporated into the plan by amendment; and

WHEREAS, the Plan for the fifteen-year period encompassing 2021-2035 has been prepared by the Forestry, Land and Parks Committee and submitted for approval of the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors;

8) Resolution 2020-12-46

Adopting a Hiring Freeze Plan

WHEREAS, as a hedge against the 2021 budget impacts (both state and local) resulting from COVID-19, the Administrative & Legislative Committee recommends adoption of the "Hiring Freeze Plan" recited below; and NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the plan is adopted as set forth below.

Hiring Freeze Plan

<u>Purpose</u>: With the uncertainty of the economic impacts resulting from COVID-19, Lincoln County will be implementing a hiring freeze plan. The purpose of the hiring freeze plan is to reduce county expenditures and evaluate staffing reductions through attrition.

<u>Goal</u>: The intention of the hiring freeze plan is to reduce expenditures to help offset the loss in revenue, while ensuring critical services are maintained. All current and future vacant positions that are non-essential (with the exception of deputies and jailers) will be left unfilled through 5/19/2021, unless an exception is granted. <u>Approval</u>: No approvals to fill vacant positions shall be granted by the Administrative Coordinator or Administrative & Legislative Committee unless one the following criteria is met:

- The position is essential to ongoing operations.
- There is a possibility of consolidating or combining with other position(s), not limited to combining positions within the same department.

Moratorium on Non-Essential Spending

<u>Purpose</u>: With the uncertainty of the economic impacts resulting from COVID-19, Lincoln County will be implementing a moratorium on non-essential spending. The purpose of the moratorium is to reduce county expenditures and evaluate non-essential purchases.

<u>Nonessential purchases</u>: Any expenditure for anything should be made ONLY if it is essential to continuing to provide the core services/mission of a department. Departments should utilize stock on-hand and refrain from purchasing bulk stock beyond what is needed for 30 days. Equipment and vehicle purchases should be delayed to

the greatest extent possible. Replacement schedules for all equipment and vehicles will be closely examined and likely delayed. No contracts for new programs/services are allowed under this moratorium. They will be considered for approval as part of the 2021 budget adoption process.

<u>Goal</u>: The intention of the moratorium is to reduce expenditures to help offset the loss in revenue, while ensuring critical services are maintained. All current non-essential purchases will be delayed through 5/19/2021. <u>Approval</u>: Any non-essential purchases are prohibited unless permission is granted from oversight committee, Finance Committee and County Board.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors does resolve to conduct a county wide advisory referendum, to be held with the Spring Election on April 6, 2021; and directs the following countywide advisory referendum question be placed on the ballot:

Question: Under state law, the increase in the levy of the County of Lincoln for the tax to be imposed for the next tax year (2022) is limited to .530%, which results in a levy estimated at \$ 14,071,977. Shall the County of Lincoln be allowed to exceed this limit and increase the levy by \$700,000 for EACH YEAR 2022-2026 for the purpose of funding Highway Department operations and road maintenance?

Explanatory Statement

Under state law, no political subdivision may increase its' levy in any year by a percentage that exceeds the political subdivision's valuation factor. This has severely limited the County's ability to fund ongoing Highway Department operations and road maintenance.

The additional \$700,000/year levy has an estimated \$26.40 tax impact on a \$100,000 home.

A "**yes**" vote indicates you agree with exceeding this limit by \$700,000 each year (2022- 2026) to fund Highway Department operations and road maintenance.

A "**no**" vote indicates you disagree with exceeding the levy limits.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk publish the Notice of Referendum in accordance with statutory requirements.

Support of Increased County Child Support Funding

WHEREAS: The Lincoln County Child Support Agency administers the Child Support Enforcement Program on behalf of the state, providing services to Lincoln County residents including paternity establishment, obtaining child support and health insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those orders; and

WHEREAS: Our children's well-being, economic security and success in life are enhanced by parents who provide financial and emotional support; and

WHEREAS: County child support agencies collected \$935 Million in child support during 2019 and established 98,405 health insurance orders for Wisconsin children; and

WHEREAS: Lincoln County's Child Support Agency provides services to children as well as custodial and non-custodial parents that reduce childhood poverty rates, establish parental rights and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children; and

WHEREAS: The economic security and social service programs provided by Lincoln County Child Support Agency are needed by Wisconsin children and families now more than ever due to the economic downturn caused by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS: State funding for county child support services has failed to keep up with county agency costs, which have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation and new federal regulations; and

WHEREAS: Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program has fallen from 2nd in the nation for collecting current support to 5th; and

WHEREAS: Wisconsin's decreased performance has led to the state losing out on an estimated \$70,000 in potential federal incentive payments between Calendar Year 2019 and 2020; and

WHEREAS: An abrupt federal interpretation change in June 2019 eliminated \$4.2 million in federal birth cost recovery matching funds for Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS: Wisconsin's strong performance in child support is at risk without additional state funding. Further drops in performance would result in additional reductions to federal funding for Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS: Decreased federal funding results in less funding for Lincoln County's child support agency. This could lead to reductions in child support enforcement staff and services and reduced child support collections; and

WHEREAS: New state investments in child support are amplified by a generous federal match. Every \$1 of state GPR invested in the Child Support Program generates roughly \$2 in federal matching funds; and

WHEREAS: Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly costeffective, collecting an average of \$6.20 in support for every dollar invested in the program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors respectfully requests that state funding for county child support agencies be increased by \$4 million GPR in each fiscal year of the 2021-23 Wisconsin state budget, which will generate approximately \$7.7 million in additional federal funding each year. This investment will ensure that Wisconsin counties can continue to effectively provide economic support to our children.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the County Clerk to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, State Senators and State Representatives representing Lincoln County, the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Administration, the Wisconsin Counties Association for consideration and all other counties.
